- 1 The United Nations Security Council,
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Emphasizing its function as the body primarily responsible for the maintenance of international peace and security as stated in the United Nations Charter Art. 24;

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6 *Reaffirming* its commitment to the core human rights conventions, which include, but are not limited

7 to, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (1948), the International Covenant on Civil and

8 Political Rights (1966), the International Covenant on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights (1966),

9 the International Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination (1965), the

Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women (1979), the Convention 10 on the Rights of the Child (1989), the International Convention on the Protection of the Rights of All

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Migrant Workers and Members of Their Families (1990), the International Convention for the 13 Protection of All Persons from Enforced Disappearance (2006), the Convention on the Rights of

Persons with Disabilities (2006), and their respective Protocols, and, furthermore, keeping in mind the 14

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basic principles of peacekeeping as noted in the report of the Panel on United Nations Peace 16 Operations ("Brahimi Report": 2000), such as consent of the parties, impartiality, and non-use of

17 force, except in self-defense and defense of the mandate, and expecting complete fulfillment of the

- 18 mandates:
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20 Conscious of the fact that consent-based peacekeeping operations follow from Chapter VI of the 21 Charter of the United Nations (1945) and are a crucial instrument in maintaining international peace 22 and security, and further *noting* that the General Assembly allocates the peacekeeping budget in

- 23 accordance with Article 17 of the Charter of the United Nations (1945);
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25 Stressing once again the importance of cooperation with regional and sub-regional organizations in 26 peacekeeping operations as stated in Security Council Resolution 2378 (2017) and Security Council Resolution 2320 (2016), and, thereby, noting with appreciation the extensive cooperation between the 27 28 United Nations and the African Union in African peacekeeping operations; 29

- 1. *Encourages* relevant regional organizations to further develop their institutional framework by establishing bodies concerned with peace and security decision-making, and welcomes further exchange of effective practices on this matter between the United Nations and regional organizations;
 - 2. *Recommends* that peacekeeping operations accredited by the Security Council but led by regional organizations shall be treated the same way as other United Nations peacekeeping operations by the General Assembly in matters of peacekeeping budgeting, which includes the possibility for additional voluntary contributions and affirms that the extent of the financing is in the discretion of the Security Council;
- 3. Decides to partially finance consent-based peacekeeping operations that are led by regional or sub-regional organizations and accredited by the Security Council under the condition that commonly agreed standards and mechanisms of peacekeeping and human rights are upheld;
 - a. Aiming at a proportion of 75%, and expecting a minimum of 25%, in the financing of regional peacekeeping operations by the United Nations;
- 48 b. Whereby the accreditation of the Security Council endorses the peacekeeping mission and specifies the financing under the condition of compliance with specific 49 50 conditions;

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52	с.	Requiring the continuous compliance with commonly agreed-upon standards of
53		human rights and peacekeeping for the sustained approval of financing, which include
54		the following:
55		i. Human Rights Conventions that have been commenced and are considered
56		part of international law, including, but not limited to, the core international
57		human rights conventions;
58		ii. The Principles of Peacekeeping Operations as stated in the Brahimi Report,
59		which are consent of the parties, impartiality, and the non-use of force except
60		for self-defense or the defense of the mandate;

67		Security Council and the General Assembly quarterly or whenever requested by the

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70	e.	Further recommending that the Secretary-General or the Security Council may advise
71		the concerned regional organization on measures to improve compliance, which may
72		include the provision of training for peacekeeping forces facilitated by the Department
73		of Peace Operations, regular consultation and changes in the command structure;
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75	f.	Noting that past behavior and action will be included in the Security Council
